<b>Latin Seminar</b>	Complete prior to dissertation, generally by the end of the third year.		
<b>Greek Seminar</b>	Complete prior to dissertation, generally by the end of the third year.		
<b>Ancient History Seminar</b>	Complete prior to dissertation, generally by the end of the third year.		
<b>4<sup>th</sup> Seminar</b> (either Latin or Greek)	Complete prior to dissertation, generally by the end of the third year.		
<b>5<sup>th</sup> Seminar</b> (either Latin, Greek, Art History, or Philosophy)	Complete prior to dissertation, generally by the end of the third year.		
<b>Total Credits</b> (Minimum 32 Credits)	Complete prior to dissertation, generally by the end of the third year.		
<b>Latin Sight Reading Exam</b>	In most cases, one sight exam is completed with the MA, the second should be completed by the end of the first year in the Ph.D program.		
<b>Greek Sight Reading Exam</b>			
<b>Foreign Language Exams (2)</b> (German and French or Italian)	Usually completed with the MA or complete within two academic years or four semesters
